The first time I saw and photographed this windmill was in 2015 about two years after it had been fully restored.

It is thought to have been built around 1760 and is described as a stone tower mill with common sails, meaning it has an open wooden frame bearing sail cloth. Ironwork dated 1889 suggests repairs at that time but it is thought that it came to the end of its working life sometime before the First World War following the invention of the internal combustion engine.

If you would like to see it the nearest road is the A329 between Thame and Stadhampton in Oxfordshire. It's clearly visible from the road between Great Haseley and Great Milton.
